## **December's Featured Speaker**

Jacquie has been flying aerobatics regularly for the past seven years, and has logged over 1000 hours of aerobatic flight. She bought the "Red Eagle" on April 1, 2000, which is one of three Pitts' that were built to fly on July 4, 1986 around the Statue of Liberty for the centennial celebration following the restoration of Ms. Liberty.

Jacquie started competing in International Aerobatic Club competition in August of 2000. "I believe this is one of the best ways to improve my skill as an aerobatic pilot and get involved with those who love to fly "rightsidedown" like I do", said Warda. She has won several awards in competition and is now competing at the Advanced level.

Air show flying appealed to Jacquie from a very early age. Born to a family with strong aviation ties, it seems fitting she should want to fly air shows now. She has been training with Wayne Handley the past 3 years. Jacquie flies 4-5 days a week practicing her aerobatic routines to achieve the demanding skill required of an

**SPORT PILOT:** That was passed, right? Well, kinda..... it's almost passed.... you know how long these things take... But there is one way to keep up on these things, through the web!

#### www.sportpilot.org

This is the "official" EAA Sport Pilot site. It's a treasure trove of information on the Sport Pilot and the status of this rule. I just logged on and it shows that the EAA was in Washington in late November to find out status. Someone's keeping an eye on this.

There's actually a lot more to this rule than just dropping the medical requirement and limiting how far from the airport you can fly. They have to figure out how to bring all the heavy ultralights into the fold, approve of all the older light aircraft, and figure out how to certify all the newly built machines.

When's the last time you looked at a popular mechanics magazine to learn about aviation? 1974 (that ultra light), 1964 (Stits fly baby), How about October 2003? Yep, Popular Mechanics ran an article on Sport Pilot aircraft and how easy they would be to build. If you missed the issue, you can log onto the above link and do a search for "Sport Pilot". Got \$50K burning a hole in your pocket and want to fly? This 12-page article gives a great overview of the type of aircraft that are available.

## **Young Eagles Flight Facts**

- More than 1 million young people have received an airplane ride through the Young Eagles Program
- 1 million Young Eagles represents approximately 200 young people flown for each public use airport in the country
- 1 million Young Eagles represents 10 young people flown for each school in the United States
- More than 34,000 EAA members have volunteered their time and aircraft to participate as Young Eagle Flight Leaders (pilots)
- The average number of Young Eagles flown per pilot is 29. Individual numbers range from 1 to *nearly 3,000*!
- During 2003, an average of 553 Young Eagles are added to the World's Largest Logbook each business day.
- An average Young Eagles registration takes 80 keystrokes. That equates to an average of 44,240 keystrokes per day.
- · Flight Leader experience levels range from private pilots to Airline Transport Pilots (ATP).
- Young Eagle flights have taken place in nearly every type of aircraft including standard factory-built, amateur-built, antiques, classics, warbirds, aerobatic, jets, helicopters, balloons and gliders.

Children from more than 90 different

countries have become Young Eagles.

· Airports utilized for the Young Eagles Program range from private grass strips to major metropolitan airports



- · An estimated *434*,782 Young Eagle Flights have taken place
- · On average there are 2.3 *Young Eagles per flight*
- · 869,564 take offs and landings have occurred
- 144,927 flight hours (or 8,695,640 minutes) have been logged by General Aviation aircraft in the Young Eagles Program (20 minute average flight)
- More than 1,594,197 gallons of aviation fuel has been donated by EAA members, participating FBOs and associated program participants (based on 11 gallons per hour average)

Fuel sales have generated an estimated \$3,746,362 (based on an average price of \$2.35 per gallon). This does not include the other costs (oil, brakes or tires) directly involved in flying

## **IFR Refresher Online**

The AOPA Air Safety Foundation has just introduced Single-Pilot IFR (www.aopa.org/asf/single\_pilot\_ifr/), a free online course designed to help pilots come to grips with the often rapid-fire decisions involved in flying in the soup. "Single-Pilot IFR focuses on decision-making, organization, and cockpit resource management," said ASF Executive Director Bruce Landsberg. "Staying 'ahead of the plane' is even more criti-

cal when you can't see."

The new interactive program uses true-orfalse, multiple choice, and other question formats in an entertaining atmosphere to effectively teach a serious topic. By the time a pilot finishes the course, he or she will understand many of the risks and challenges of single-pilot IFR operations.


