Ideas on Wheel Pants By Bob Kindlund

When I walk around Reid-Hillview, I see fixed gear aircraft with and without wheel pants and I've wondered what the difference in performance is. On some high performance aircraft, we neatly tuck the gear up into the wing or fuselage to gain higher speeds. On new designs, such as Cirrus or Lanciar, are aircraft that have fixed gear and are attaining speeds equal to or greater than aircraft with retractable gear. But even these new designs still have a portion of the tire sticking out of the bottom of the fairing. What if we could have doors that covered the exposed portion of the tire while in flight, would that make an improvement in performance?

In 1971, Jim Bede received a patent (U.S.

patent number 3,750,986) for wheel pants (fairings) that included doors on the bottom that would cover the wheels while the aircraft was in flight. When taxiing, landing or taking off, the doors would be open to allow



the wheels to make contact with the ground. The doors could be operated mechanically, electrically, hydraulically or pneumatically. On the BD-4, a push-pull cable from the cockpit operates the doors.


In the patent, he states that with the tire exposed at the bottom of the fairing, the fairing creates a cavity into which air can enter and cause



aerodynamic profile and thus reduce drag.

Both of these patents cover ideas and designs that could bring improvement in performance to GA aircraft. But to gain this improvement, there is added complexity and cost to parts of the aircraft and these costs are not detailed in the patents. If you would like to read these patents in drag and vibration. With the tire covered and the fairing properly designed, aerodynamically, there could be significant improvements in reducing drag. He states that in actual tests, aircraft using this invention have an increase in airspeed of approximately 10%.

In 2006, Clifford Cordy received a patent (U.S. patent number 7,108,225) for an improved version of the Bede patent. Basically, Mr. Cordy refines the shape of the fairing , as shown in his figures, to give a more
