According to Stéphane, the complexity of current avionics, combined with other factors, drives up the time and cost of becoming a pilot and staying proficient. Smartplane seeks to simplify the aircraft cockpit by developing avionics that provide a highly intuitive user interface and automate many of the piloting tasks on behalf of the pilot.



Stéphane is a graduate of UCLA with a BS in Mechanical Engineering and later earned his MBA from Columbia University. His career has included engineering at Aerojet Electrosystems, and management positions at Unisys, Wang Labs, and at cybersecurity company Passlogix. Passlogix was sold to Oracle in 2010.

Hollister Air Show

The 4th annual Hollister Air Show will be held Memorial Day weekend, May 25 and 26, 2013. This show gets better with each year. Gates will open at 9:00 AM on both Saturday and Sunday and flyins are welcome. The air show opening is scheduled for 11:00 AM at the airport will be closed to

arriving aircraft at that time. The air show is

scheduled to end at 4:00 PM.

At this time performers scheduled to appear at this year's air show include Eddie Andreini, Vicki Benzing, Vance Breese, Dr. D, Jerod Flohr, and Carl Liepold.

Eddie Andreini flies a highly modified Boeing PT-13 D Stearman that started out as a WW II primary trainer with a 225 hp Lycoming engine. It is now known as the "Super Stearman" and is powered by a 450 hp Pratt and Whitney engine with inverted fuel and oil systems. Last year, in addition



to his performance in the "Super Stearman", Eddie also flew an aerobatic performance in his North American P- 51D Mustang, which was restored in 2011. It is named "Primo Branco" and has a black and yellow checkered paint scheme with a highly polished fuselage. You can learn more about Eddie at www.eddieandreiniairshows.com.



Vicki Benzing flies a modified single seat German-built Extra 300S. She has logged over 5000 flight hours and holds both a Commercial Helicopter and Airline Transport Pilot rating. Vance Breese will be flying his one-of-a-kind experimental gyroplane that was designed and built by A&P mechanic, Mark Givans. Dr. Frank Donnelly, otherwise known as "Dr D", flies a 1946 Taylorcraft and is bringing back old-time aerobatics. He has over 6000 hours and holds commercial pilot single-engine land and private pilot glider ratings. He not only flies aircraft but he also services them. He holds an Aircraft Inspector Authorization and Airframe/Powerplant rating. He is a retired psychology professor from a Susan Pacific University and lives in San Dimas, California. Jerod Flohr is fairly new on the air show circuit. He was born and raised in a small town in West Texas and after graduating high school he went straight to flight school. He has worked all throughout Texas, including instructing Air Force pilots and navigators in San Antonio, commercial pilots in Fort

Worth, and teaching at Harvey-Rhin Aviation in Houston. While at Harvey-Rhin, he got his tailwheel and aerobatic privileges in the Super Decathlon. He moved to the Bay Area to pursue his lifelong dream of becoming both an air show pilot and the best aerobatic instructor he can be. He graduated from

Sean Tucker's Tutima Academy of Aviation Safety under the tutelage of Sean Tucker and Ben Freelove, where he was fully checked out to fly and instruct in the Pitts S2B-C and Extra 300L. In addition to flying air shows, he currently instructs at Advantage Aviation. Jerod flew his 1st air show last September at the "Watsonville Fly In and Air Show". Carl Liepold is a commercial pilot who loves flying aerobatics and wants to encourage anyone who dreams of flying. He flies a Russian Yak 55M. Carl was born in Australia, and moved back and forth between the USA and Australia when he was young. He had



always want to be a fighter pilot but thought his dream was finished after getting eyeglasses in high school. He joined the Navy and served on a submarine. After leaving the Navy he pursued electrical engineering to design computer chips. All this time he continued to dream of becoming a pilot. In addition to the above performers, there is also a Douglas C-54E-15-DO Skymaster scheduled to appear. This aircraft, N460WA, serial number 44 – 9133, was built in 1944 and was delivered to the USAAF on May 24, 1945. It is now owned by Florida Air Transport Inc., Opa Locka, Florida. It is equipped with spray bars on the wings and is based at the Merced Regional Airport (KCME) in Merced, California. The aircraft is on call 24/7 to respond to oil spills off the Pacific Coast. There is another similar aircraft



based in Florida to cover the Atlantic Coast. My son, Mark, and I saw this aircraft fly at the "Wings Over Wine Country Air Show" in Santa Rosa last August. It is great to see this aircraft in flight.

Toward the end of the air show a flight of several war birds will make several passes over the runway. There are great photo opportunities to catch some war birds in flight. They also have several vendors, food at good prices and static displays. I have attended the previous three air shows and, as I

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stated in the beginning, they get better each year.

Our last general meeting was held on March 7. Rusty Wells and Randy Wilde prepared and served a hot dog dinner for a small turnout of members and one visitor. After dinner Konstantin Blank, our Chapter President, called the meeting to order. Russ Todd, our Young Eagle coordinator spoke about the upcoming Young Eagle events scheduled for the year and the need for volunteer pilots and ground support to make this season a success.

Mark Wainwright, our chapter's Vice President and newsletter editor, then introduced our evening's speaker, Mai Maheigan.

Mai Maheigan works for the Gulf of the Farallones National Marine Sanctuary and Seabird Protection Network and gave a presentation titled, "Seabirds in our Sanctuaries". She spoke to us about the wide

variety of seabirds and other marine wildlife that are protected in our local National Marine Sanctuaries. From February to

August hundreds of thousands of birds flock to our coast and islands to feed and breed. Her presentation covered the variety of seabirds and other marine wildlife which are protected in our local national Marine sanctuaries. She told us about several different seabird species, about seabird colony conservation efforts, over-flight regulations within the national Marine sanctuaries and how pilots can help protect local breeding populations as we fly the coast. She also mentioned that one of the bird species that migrate to our shores is the Sooty Shearwater. This bird has the longest animal migration routes ever recorded using electronic technology: around 39,000 miles. This is amazing. It was an interesting presentation.

I would like to thank Mai for taking the time to speak to our chapter. I wish we had had a better turnout. She also mentioned that her group will be at the Pacific Coast Dream Machines Show to be held at the Half Moon Bay airport April 27 and 28.

"The program is getting better all the time. Remember, it now provides 5 steps leading to the Private Pilot certificate and this is the first step to the exciting arena of aviation. When a young person becomes a Young Eagle after a very enjoyable and free flight at one of the 7 events planned for this year, he or she becomes eligible for the following:

a free Student EAA membership—enjoy access to the EAA Sport Aviation magazine

Academy of Model Aeronautics (AMA) Student Membership, and other benefits.

"Sporty's Complete Flight Training course a great way to take you all the way through the process of passing the FAA written exams.

"Your First flight Lesson: when a Young Eagle completes the above course he/she qualifies for a free flight lesson voucher valued at \$120 at a flight school of their choice.

"As Young Eagle Student Members who have completed Part 1 of the Recreational Pilot course you have access to flight training and college scholarships through the EAA. One scholarship of \$1500 is awarded monthly while another of \$7500 is awarded to complete the private pilot certificate.

"That's a lot that you will be providing to young people whether you are a pilot, administrator, aircraft marshal, escort or wing rib builder guide.

"So, sign up on the EAA.ORG website and be at Palo Alto at 9 am to set up and get ready to begin flying at 10 AM till 2 PM.

"Come to Palo Alto airport and join us. Its' a lot of fun.

"Let me know you're coming by registering at eaa62.org. I need you all to make this event a success.


