thing. And you know, with only a few of them built, there are the ultimate Experimentals. But we haven't heard a lot about them lately. Perhaps you have the *Spirit* to follow their treks, but the popular press isn't giving you the *Opportunity*. Well, that's where the web really shines, there's a lot of data available online.

Probably the best site to access data is the Jet Propulsion Laboratory. There are regular updates of images and the also include a lot of information on the process of how they are using the rovers to perform the scientific exploration of Mars. There are movies, live interviews, hey, a good reason to upgrade your computer!

This is a local site, that's run out of an intelligent systems group here at Ames. 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
