


David Hinojosa flying his Euro Fox



Our last general meeting was held on April 4th in the general aviation terminal at Reid Hillview airport. He called me and asked if I could pick up some hot dogs, buns and ice cream from a store and pick up the condiments from his home. I told him I could do that and that I would get to the airport early to help Randy set up for the dinner. In my haste, and because Rusty did not mention it, I forgot all about beans, salad, chips, utensils and plates. Luckily for me, Ernie, who was working at the airport that evening, had some bowls



and spoons from Santa Clara County's supply, which he gave us. Thank you Ernie.

Vice President Mark Wainwright called the meeting to order at about 7:43 PM. Once again we had a small turnout for our general meeting. There were only 11 members who attended along with one visitor. Our visitor, Al Whipper, is from San Jose and flies out of Hollister airport and will soon be building his aircraft. We hope to see Al at some more of our meetings. I wish we could get more members actively involved in the chapter. I know we all have busy schedules but it is nice to get out once in a while and visit with friends who have similar interests. Russ Todd, our Young Eagles Coordinator, talked about our first Young Eagles event of the year, which was held on April 13 at the Palo Alto airport. You can read about that event elsewhere in this newsletter. He also talked about our second event to be held on May 18 in conjunction with the WINGS of HISTORY open house at South County Airport. He asked for volunteers, both pilots and ground personnel.



Stéphane Fymat

VP Mark Wainwright then introduced Stéphane Fymat, our speaker for the evening. Stéphane is the founder and CEO of Smartplane, Inc. and came up from Southern California to speak to us about "intelligent avionics that make small aircraft as simple to fly as a car is to drive."

Stéphane is a graduate of UCLA with a BS in Mechanical Engineering and later earned his MBA from Columbia University. His career has included engineering at Aerojet Electrosystems, and manager positions at Unisys, Wang Labs and at cyber security company, Passlogix. Passlogix was sold to Oracle in 2010.

He started this project by hanging out in the Los Angeles airport Southwest Airlines lounge and asking people if they would fill out a survey about flying. While doing this he happened to meet Captain Sully Sullenberger who seemed to be interested but told him,

"something always breaks."

Stéphane has been working on this project for the last 2 1/2 years. His idea came about because he realized that Americans take 2.4 billion regional trips every year and that small aircraft could be a perfect mode of transportation for many of them. However only 0.1% of people pilot a plane for those trips because the "ALL-IN COST" is way too high for the general population. "ALL-IN COST" = time + money + effort + risk + physical-emotional experience. He believes that if we radically lower the "ALL-IN

COST" and make flying a plane as easy as driving a car, there would be a major opportunity to tip the scale toward small aircraft as a means of transportation. During the development phase, the company's focus is on Light Sport aircraft and VFR flying because the entry cost is lower and certification expenses are less than for regular GA aircraft.

The secret to making this work would be in the avionics. You would pick a destination, and plan the route. The avionics would COMMUNICATE (talk to ATC and other aircraft), NAVIGATE (follow and adapt route avoid hazards and weather), AVIATE (control speed and direction), and arrive at your destination. All of this would be accomplished by making the avionics user friendly and closer to what non-pilots are familiar with.

Stéphane gave a very interesting presentation. His company is in the early development phase. Next, the company will be testing the software in X-Plane, then in a Light Sport aircraft and early flight tests, followed
